Symptomatic persons with:

 Fever, Cough, Chills, Repeated shaking with chills, muscle pain, headache, sore throat, new loss of taste or smell.

Asymptomatic persons:

- Persons over age 65
- Those with a chronic medical condition
- Essential workers, which includes janitorial, security, airport, government, health care, food and grocery, and more.

This is in addition to testing of symptomatic and asymptomatic individuals in congregate institutional settings.

CONTINUITY OF OPERATION PLANS: (COOP)

Auditor-Controller (A/C): 74% of staff are teleworking, 36 are Disaster Service Workers, and one member is assisting DHR. For more information visit https://auditor.lacounty.gov/

Beaches and Harbors (B&H): Large crowds were reported at all beaches on Monday. Parking lots at Dockweiler and Zuma Beach were full and vehicle entry was stopped partway through the day. Large percentage of patrons without facial coverings and sitting/sunbathing, but physical distancing was mostly observed. Continue oversight of beach and marina locations while coordinating enforcement, beach re-opening, and information sharing with local public agencies and department vendors/leaseholds. Board of Supervisors (BOS): 75% of staff are teleworking, 27 staff volunteered for DSW assignments, 2 staff assigned to EOC/JIC. Evaluating workspaces and Board meeting room for social distancing needs, and working with the fire inspector to ensure appropriate storage requirements are met for sanitizers due to flammability. Chief Executive Office (CEO): 330 staff are teleworking, 80 are working onsite, and 13 staff work as DSWs. Coordinating Countywide budgetary strategies pursuant to relevant Board of Supervisors (BOS) motions. Coordinating with BOS to ensure that Board letters are reviewed and approved during periods when regular Board meetings and procedures are disrupted. Supporting the Homeless Emergency Shelter workgroup to continue to facilitate and maintain sheltering sites and provide budgetary support services. Analyzing survey data from department managers for the formulation of recovery and return-to steady state plans and strategies based on operational needs. Children and Family Services (DCFS): Calls to Child Protection Hotline continue to slowly increase. Health Services (DHS): Los Angeles Surge Hospital (LASH) is closed. Equipment and supplies are being moved to other hospitals. Continue to distribute various resources such as PPEs and Remdesivir into the health care system. Continue hiring EMTs to work at isolation/quarantine and testing sites due to labor shortages. Medical Examiner-Coroner: 8% of staff are teleworking, 2 are quarantined, and 210 are working on-site. Mental Health (DMH): Clinical programs remain active to offer essential functions necessary to prevent relapse and decompensation of our clients. DMH OPG is working with ICD and DHS on surge planning and jail releases. Submitted a proposal for the FEMA Crisis Counseling Grant (CCP) to CA DHCS. The ACCESS call line is experiencing increased call volumes with an average of over 400 calls per day, including the new LA County Employee Wellbeing Line and the LA County Emotional Support Volunteer Lines. The DMH school-based crisis (SBCAP) team continues to receive referrals and triage requests from schools. Working with CEOC partners on preliminary planning efforts for wildfire shelters. Public Works (PW): Weekly Construction Industry COVID-19 meetings have been moved under Infrastructure LA as the LA Construction Industry Subcommittee.
