SENIOR CARE:	 Continue to provide nutritious meals to all students at "Grab & Go Food Centers" at 63 locations from 8 a.m11 a.m. Issuing additional CalFresh benefits up to the maximum allowed per family and allowing CalFresh recipients to purchase groceries online for delivery from Walmart and Amazon. Completed over 91,112 meal and grocery deliveries to seniors and people with disabilities across four current projects. To date, the #LetsFeedLACounty initiative has held 9 drive-thru food distribution events, distributing 263 tons of food to 14,634 households. Over the past week, 2 of these drive-thru food distribution events in Azusa and Paramount served nearly 3,000 families distributing over 50 tons of food. The LA Regional Food Bank's on hand food inventory totals 6.9 million pounds of shelf-stable, perishable and frozen food items, approximately a two-and-a-half week supply. Collaborating with office of Supervisor Ridley-Thomas on two additional food distribution events this week in Los Angeles and Compton. 211 food-related calls up 406% from March (2,851) to April (14,486) WDACS has experienced a 40% increase in senior meals provided since March. DPSS reports a 130% increase in Cal Fresh applications since March PHFE reports a 20% increase in WIC applicants since March Distribution from the Food Bank's two distribution centers has increased by 80% compared to the first two months of 2020, and this time last year. 	Beaches and Harbors (B&H): Beach report for May 31, 2020 - light to medium crowds at Torrance, Hermosa, Manhattan, medium at Dockweiler, heavy at Venice, with up to 1,000 protestors at North Venice and Pacific Ave on Sunday evening, and medium to heavy crowds at Will Rogers and Zuma. Most locations showed approx. 50% adherence to facial coverings, distancing, and beach active-use only Health Orders. 22 DSWs reported to work at Zuma, 12 to Will Rogers, and 6 to Dockweiler on Sunday. Mental Health (DMH): Los Angeles Police Department Systemwide Mental Assessment Response Team (SMART) team activities have been suspended until LASD partners can return to regular duties. Psychiatric Emergency Teams (PET) remain operational but DMH has encountered some deployment difficulties due to George Floyd protest disruptions. Staff continue to deploy as DSWs, to provide services in PEH shelters and other medical QI shelters. Access Helpline and all COVID emotional support lines remain operational.
