	<ul> <li>Symptomatic persons with:</li> <li>Fever or chills, Cough, Shortness of breath or difficulty breathing, Fatigue, Muscle or body aches, Headache, New loss of taste or smell, Sore throat, Congestion or runny nose, Nausea or vomiting, and Diarrhea.</li> </ul>				
	Symptomatic persons who are:				
	<ul> <li>Hospitalized</li> <li>Healthcare workers and other first responders</li> <li>Employees and residents in group living settings, and</li> <li>Over 65 years old or with <u>underlying health conditions</u> that place them at higher risk of serious complications</li> </ul>				
	Asymptomatic persons:				
	<ul> <li>If they are part of a public health investigation</li> <li>If they live or work in high risk settings, such as skilled nursing facilities or homeless shelters</li> <li>If they are a close contact of someone with a confirmed positive diagnosis of COVUD 10, or</li> </ul>				
	<ul><li>diagnosis of COVID-19, or</li><li>If they are an essential worker.</li></ul>				
	Prioritization of routine testing among other asymptomatic people is not recommended at this time. People over the age of 65 or with underlying conditions do not necessarily need to be tested unless they have symptoms, have had an exposure or have been told by public health to be tested. Once again, please check with your healthcare provider about your specific situation and let their medical advice guide you.
